While many equate May to the Memorial Day holiday, for the Veterans of Foreign Wars, there is a day that has significance as it was the VFW that had it recognized. That day is May 1st, Loyalty Day. The day provides an opportunity for all American citizens to reaffirm their loyalty. Patriotic rallies, parades, public meetings, school programs and other activities are some examples

that show citizens' patriotism and loyalty to our government.

Loyalty Day's roots are not recent. The idea to hold patriotic rallies started in 1930 to offset the Communist rallies that were held on May Day. The VFW's involvement began with the adoption of a resolution at the VFW National Convention in 1949 to make vides citizens the opportu-May 1 as Loyalty Day. In 1954, the resolution was introduced in Congress and approved in 1955. It was officially recognized with the adoption of Public Law 529 in 1958.

Memorial Day gives the opportunity to honor the men and women who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces. It was known first as Decoration Day as the day graves of fallen Civil War soldiers were decorated. The name Memorial Day came into use in 1882. The name was declared by federal law in 1967. Some confuse Memorial Day with Veterans Day. While Memorial Day remembers those who died while serving, Veterans Day honors everyone who has served in the armed services.

The month of May pronities to participate in activities that reflect continuing loyalty to America and honoring those who gave their lives to maintain our cherished freedoms. If you are not able to attend an organized activity on Memorial Day, you can pause for a moment of silence at 3:00 p.m. on that day to honor those who have died in service to the nation, as The National Moment of Remembrance Act of 2000 encourages.

## Museum of Flight Profile of New Member, Bob Drew

If you have a question at home, you can consult Bing or Google. If you have a question at The Museum of Flight, you can consult knowledgeable docents like Bob Drew. Bob is not just a fountain of Museum of Flight information, but he offers the perspective of a veteran pilot who has logged over 9,000 hours in more than 75 aircraft types. Many of those aircraft (think P-38 Lighting, P-51 Mustang, A-4 Skyhawk, F-86 Sabre and F-104 Starfighter) are on display at the Museum.

Bob first flew more than 70 years ago. He joined the Army Air Corps in 1943 and by mid-1945 was flying P-38 missions from the Philippines during the waning months of World War II. Missions as far as Formosa (now Taiwan) meant long hours in the narrow cockpit. In 1946, back from active duty, he joined the California National Guard flying P-51s and, later, F-86 Sabres.

Bob always enjoyed trying new aircraft, even if they weren't part of his assignment. He had a friend in the Naval Reserve flying Corsairs who wanted to try Bob's P-51. One weekend, the Naval pilot flew up and swapped planes with Bob so they could each experiment with the other's hardware. In 1952, he joined Douglas Aircraft Company as a flight test engineer flying AD-5, 6 and 7 Skyraiders. He later moved to engineer flight test in the F4D Skyray program, where he contributed to the refinement of the innovative, delta winged interceptor. Though its 1956 to 1962 service life was short, Bob believes the aircraft contributed much to the development of new concepts during that period. It held world records for both speed and time to climb and Bob is justifiably proud of his contribution to that development.

The Skyray test work often took him to Edwards Air Force Base and the Navy's Patuxent River Naval Air Test Center where he was exposed to aircraft and crews from other manufacturers. While he was a "Douglas" guy, the collegial atmosphere at the test facilities gave him the opportunity to log time in "non-Douglas" aircraft. It was a "you can fly mine if I can fly yours" at-

mosphere.

Bob recalls having pilots, like Alan Shepard and Deke Slayton, flying chase planes for his test flights.
They and others like them gained later notoriety as astronauts. Much to his wife's chagrin, his need for speed drew Bob into the Air Rac-



ing circuit, where he flew 15 different custom-designed racers during a long racing career. Bob liked speed on the ground as well. He discovered a big Cadillac engine that could be squeezed into his 1955 robin's egg blue Thunder-bird convertible. He had the engine installed and claims he was able to reach 140 miles per hour at Dry Lake speed courses.

In 2000, a friend encouraged Bob to join The Museum of Flight docent corp. "They told me I had to take docent training to qualify," Bob reports. "I thought I knew a great deal about aviation until I took that class. It was quite an education!"

After 14 years as a docent, he still looks forward to his Wednesday shift. "I just enjoy all the great people who work here, and I particularly like working the T. A. Wilson Great Gallery and the J. Elroy McCaw Personal Courage Wing. So many of the plane types I've flown are on display in those areas."

The Museum is fortunate Bob has the same number of takeoffs as landings, all of which he was able to walk away from. Bob has contributed 3,100 volunteer hours during his tenure and, despite his 90 years, shows no sign of slowing down.

#### **Members Away From Home: Georgia Warrix**

The 1190 Transportation Surface Brigade, located in Baton Rouge, La., is my current duty assignment. The unit is an Army Reserve unit administratively controlled under the Deployment Support Command to sustain the current affiliation within the Army Reserve component. Operational control remains with the Surface Deployment and Distribution Command (SDDC); the Brigade's Active component affiliation.

The 1190 Transportation Surface Brigade's current mission command consist of three battalions and 14 detachments. During Presidential and Congressional Call-Up, the brigade itself would assume mission command of all active component battalions aligned in the Gulfport states currently operating under SDDC. Their mission is to manage and oversee all port operations within these area vessel ports.

Just one of the gulf vessel ports during Operation Enduring Freedom moved approximately 330 vessels toward the Persian Gulf in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

This year, the 1190
Transportation Surface Brigade has personnel deploying to various areas in the Middle East, participating in port operations in Texas and maintaining their evaluated training markers in Army Reserve exercises.


