Unfortunately, I learned that Doug Zeller was indeed killed in Vietnam but not listed on the Ballard High School Vietnam Memorial Plague. So "The Ballard Eighteen" became "The Ballard Nineteen."

Post provides honor guard for Mariano Berona's funeral

Three members of our Ballard Eagleson Honor Guard attended a funeral at Acacia Memorial Park and Funeral Home on Saturday, Oct. 15, 2016. Together with other members of VFW District 2, they rendered VFW funeral honors to Mariano Berona, who was 98 years old, a member and past commander of Post 6599, and a District 2 Veteran of the Year.

Comrade Berona was a survivor of the Bataan Death March and retired from the US Army in 1962 as a sergeant first class. Even though the graveside service was held in a pouring rain, over 100 family and other mourners attended as an active Army Honor Guard fired the gun salute, played Taps, and performed a rare sixperson fold of the

Officer Profile: Harold Rodenberger, Post 3063 Quartermaster

This is part of a series of profiles of the 2016-2017 Post 3063 officers.

Tell us about your new position and what you hope to accomplish during your term.

I was reelected as quartermaster this year and so will continue to serve our post, its members and officers as a sort of jack-of-all-trades, ready to do the many things that keep our post in operation and moving forward. During this year I hope to encourage and help our members become more active in post activities and to sign up new recruits to join our post.

How long have you belonged to Post 3063 and did you previously serve in an officer position?

I joined this post in 1982, not long after I retired from the Army. When the next election time rolled around I was elected to the office of junior vice commander followed by senior vice commander and then I served as commander during the 1985-86 year. After completion of that term I was appointed as adjutant and served in that office for eighteen years. In 2004 I was reelected as commander and served another four years in that position. In 2008 I was elected as chaplain and served in that office until elected as quartermaster in 2013 and have served in that office since.

What is your military background?

I enlisted in the Army Security Agency to attend Russian language school in April of 1959. After I was locked in they told me that because of my poor hearing I was not eligible for language training so I was sent to Morse Code school instead. Go figure. Hearing too bad for language training but I could listen to those ditty dahs all day. After serving two tours in Japan with the ASA I transferred to the Adjutant General Corps as an admin specialist, MOS 717, back in those days.

From Japan I was transferred to Ft Sam Houston, Texas, where I served in the Hospital Inspector's Office at Brooke Army Medical Center. Off to Vietnam where I was assigned to the AG's Office in MACV then to South Carolina as an advisor to the SC National Guard. Next came another assignment to Japan, this time in Yokohama where I was the Detachment Sergeant of a Transportation Detachment whose members ran the Port of Yokohama at North Pier. While there I applied for the Army degree completion program and then took a break from the Army while attending Sofia University (a Jesuit affiliate of Seattle U and Gonzaga) in Tokyo for two years.

After graduation from Sophia I was assigned as First Sergeant of the Armed Forces Entrance and Examining Station here in Seattle and, with my family, lived for a while in the old Navy Capehart housing at Ft Lawton.

In 1976 I was selected to attend the relatively new US Army Sergeants Major Academy at Ft Bliss, TX, so left my family here

> and six months later graduated with Class 9 from USASMA and was assigned as an advisor to the National Guard Advisory Group at Ft MacArthur, CA, where I advised units in California and Arizona.

> My last tour in the Army was with the US Southern Command in Panama where I was Chief of Admin Operations and also served as administrative member of the IG team inspecting MAAGs and Missions throughout Central and South America.

What do you enjoy most about belonging to the VFW?

I enjoy the camaraderie with brothers (and sisters) who have served in the armed forces but

I also try to remember that I need to give back to the older veterans and our community for the help and support they gave me during my years in the military. To complete the cycle, I must pass along to the younger military members and veterans that same help and support I received when I was younger.

Is there anything else you'd like to tell Post 3063 members?

To paraphrase Woody Guthrie, "this post is your post, this post is my post. . ." Our post can only survive and grow if we all contribute as much as we can to support the programs, serve as officers, work on committees and recruit new members. I know there are other things competing for your time but please remember that we can be the best VFW Post in Seattle, and even in Washington, if we all help to make it happen.

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How the VFW stays tax-exempt: Community Service

Since our founding as a federally chartered organization in 1899, our members have worked to help veterans and their families, to further patriotism and Americanism, and to help our communities. Because these goals are part of our mission the Internal Revenue Service has granted us tax-exempt status under the provisions of Section 501 (c) (19) of the tax code.

To maintain our tax-exempt status, each month we report community service performed by our members. Reports from the posts and districts are forwarded to and consolidated by the departments and from there forwarded to our national headquarters. **To make these reports more complete we ask that each of our members forward qualifying actions so as much as possible can be included each month.**

You might be surprised to learn that many things you do should be included so please make a note to compile and forward your contributions in the following areas.

Community Service: Activities that benefit your community, parks or neighborhood such as:

- Recycling
- Picking up trash
- Beautification projects
- Monetary donations to a local park, farmers' market, or similar

Citizenship Education and Americanism: Participation in:

- Parades
- Patriotic holiday events
- Public ceremonies
- Presenting flags or educational materials
- Attending funerals
- POW/MIA activities
- Loyalty Day activities
- Legislative activities

- Flying the American Flag (please specify lighted or unlit)
- Participation in Color/Honor Guard activities or placing flags on veterans' graves

Aid to Others:

- Hospital and nursing home visits
- Visits with senior citizens or house-bound neighbors
- Donations of care packages
- Helping to organize a blood drive or individual donations of blood, platelets, or plasma
- Fundraising or assisting to build handicapped ramps or other home repairs and transporting others to doctors or hospital visits
- Donations of money or materials to the needy or thrift stores or other charitable organizations (please itemize so we can assign dollar values)
- Donations to homeless or to organizations that help the homeless and other charitable causes such as the USO, cancer society, March of Dimes, etc.

Youth Activities:

- Assisting at schools as guest speaker, volunteer coaching
- Donating money, materials or time to support Scouts, children's sports or band functions
- Helping with Special Olympics or other help for special students or children

Voice of Democracy, Youth Essay and Patriotic Art:

 Donations of time and money to locate, encourage and assist students to enter the VFW Voice of Democracy, Patriot's Pen, Youth Essay and Patriotic Art contests

Safety:

 Giving or attending classes or time and money spent to encourage safety, broken down by pedestrian, drug awareness, recreational, highway, fire or home safety

Military Assistance:

- Any support given to a military unit, individual, or family member
- Sponsoring or attending "welcome home" ceremonies and other ceremonies honoring the military
