In Memoriam: Remembering Bob Drew

I never had a chance to speak with Bob Drew. He was an old man when he joined our post. Those who did meet him were impressed with his quiet demeanor and presence of mind. Many of those who knew Bob weren't aware of his background. He was just another

old man who didn't ask for any special attention or help. He was part of The Greatest Generation and like a lot of old people in our society, he flew under the radar living a quiet life in his old age.

But, when he was younger, what a full life he led!

During WWII he was a fighter pilot flying P-38's and P-51's in the Pacific Theater. After the war he joined the California National Guard and went to work

for Douglas Aircraft as a test pilot, flying the Navy AD Skyraider and F4D Skyray. Working with Douglas until 1962 he flew all manner of fighters, single and multiengine military and commercial aircraft and anything

else that took off. During his test pilot days he flew with future astronauts Alan Shepard and Deke Slayton and other famous test pilots. Since he was attracted to speed, he also flew Formula One pylon racers from 1953 to 1993.

In 2000, Bob became a docent for the Museum of Flight. If you happened to have him as a guide while visiting the museum you were in for great guided tour since he had flown many of the planes on display. We draped our charter to remember Bob at our meeting held on July 11, 2019, and it remained draped in his honor for thirty days.

Robert E. Drew, WWII fighter pilot, supersonic test pilot, friend of astronauts, Formula One Pylon Racer, museum docent and member of our post, has made his last flight.

It's That Time of Year Again: Get Your Flu Shot

During flu season, protecting your health with a flu shot is easier than ever — and as close as your local VA or neighborhood Walgreens! VA and Walgreens care about your health and are partnering to offer enrolled Veteran patients easy access to flu shots.

VA and Walgreens are national partners, providing no-cost quadrivalent flu shots to enrolled Veterans of the VA health care system. During the program, which runs from August 15, 2019 through March 31, 2020, enrolled Veteran patients nationwide have the option of getting their flu shot at any of Walgreens' 9,600 locations in addition to their local VA health care facilities. No appointment is required; simply go to any Walgreens, tell the pharmacist you receive care at a VA facility, and show your Veterans Health Identification Card and another form of photo ID.

Your immunization record will be updated electronically in your VA electronic health record. Walgreens

has the capability to electronically send vaccination information to the VA electronic health record. The VA -Walgreens national partnership is part of VA's



eHealth Exchange project. This national program ensured that many Veterans got their no-cost flu shot at their local Walgreens, satisfying their wellness reminder because they either found it more convenient or did not have a scheduled appointment at a local VA health care facility.

Armed Forces License Plates Available at the Dept. of Licensing

The Washington Department of Licensing issues license plates to eligible veterans/military/family

members with six separate designs, each containing a symbol representing a different branch of the armed forces to include Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard, and WA National Guard.

Purchasers also receive a decal indicating their military status, to include: Veteran, Retired, Active Duty, Reserves,

Disabled Veteran, Army Guard, Air Guard, Army Retired (for Army National Guard Retirees), Air Retired (for Air National Guard Retirees), Fallen Hero (This decal would be available for an eligible family member of a military member killed in action), Family, Gold Star (A separate Gold Star License Plate is also available to certain family members.)





Visit http://www.dol.wa.gov/vehicleregistration/spmilitary.html for information on initial and renewal plate fees. \$28 from the purchase and renewal of each plate is directed to the Veterans Stewardship Account and is tax deductible.

The Veterans Stewardship Account is used for activities that benefit veterans, such as maintaining the state veteran's cemetery in eastern Washington and providing programs and ser-

vices for homeless veterans.

What do you hope to achieve being a member of the VFW?




What's Happening In and Around the Post
