History was made at the Veterans of Foreign Wars

National Convention in July when National Commander Brian Duffy was elected as the VFW's new leader. His election presented a new era in that he became the first Operation Desert Storm veteran to become the VFW commander-in-chief. Quartermaster General Debra Anderson joins Duffy in being the first Operation Desert Storm veteran to be appointed to the position. Additionally, she is the first woman veteran to be a quartermaster general. This is the direction of the VFW as well as key to its future.

At our post, our future also hinges on newer generations of veterans to join,

lead, and be active participants. It is apparent that our membership has younger veterans and veterans from more recent wars and campaigns. In his acceptance speech at the convention, the national commander remarked that the VFW wasn't resonating with a newer generation and that we have to do a better job of marketing the VFW to younger veterans.

I agree with the VFW's focus on getting younger veterans to join. Because they have new perspectives and fresh ideas, they are instrumental in helping to maintain the posts' vitality and keeping them active. is also key to the success of the organization. Early on, women veterans were not able to join the VFW but rather were steered into joining the Ladies Auxiliary. My, how times have changed – and for the better.

And what about those I term as "seasoned" members? They play an important role in the accomplishments of a post. It was their collective experiences and institutional knowledge that made the post successful as they put their knowledge to work in leadership and member roles.

I am pleased with the way our post continues to be active on many fronts. It is because of the younger veterans, the women veterans, and the seasoned veterans who comprise Ballard Eagleson Post 3063.

Save big bucks with a lifetime VFW membership

Every once in a while it's good to review our membership requirements and various membership options.

As you know we are the Veterans of Foreign Wars. In order to join our organization a potential member must show documentary evidence, usually a copy of DD Form 214, of service in a designated war zone. They must also be a Citizen or National of the United States. The only other requirement is an Honorable Discharge.

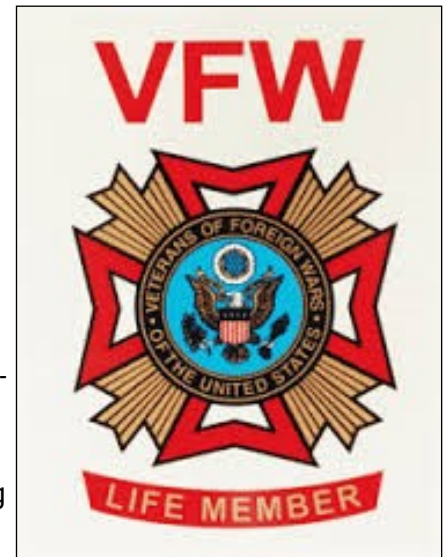
Most people join as annual members, paying dues at the going rate each year. Currently our dues are thirty dollars which is the combination of National and Department (state) dues since our post, unlike most, does not charge any additional dues.

As you can see by doing some simple math these annual dues add up over the years so I encourage our annual members to consider taking out a life membership. We have one person who has been paying annual dues for 69 years. Imagine how much he could have saved if he had converted to life membership early in this period.

The fees for life membership are age based and they presently range from \$450 for those up through 30 years old to \$170 for those 81 and older. The fee can be paid as a lump sum or spread out over a year using the Life Install-

ment Plan.

To get a real bargain on a life membership, once you attend three business meetings you become eligible for the quarterly drawing when we award a free life membership to a lucky annual member who is in attendance. This is your chance to save big bucks so plan on attending our regular meetings.

Officer Profile: Pete Krawitz, Post 3063 Sr. Vice, Adjutant

This is the second profile in a series of profiles of the 2016-2017 Post 3063 officers.

Tell us about your new position and what you hope to accomplish during your term.

I'm very honored to have been nominated and elected to take this new position as the post's senior vice commander and adjutant. My duties as the senior vice commander are to preside in the absence of the commander and offer my advice and support.

My responsibilities as the adjutant are mostly administrative. I record, review, amend, and archive the meeting minutes, help determine the eligibility of prospective members, send out correspondence to our members, and often times provide the "second signature" on many of the post's official business documents.

As one of the post's younger members, I hope to provide the team with a set of fresh eyes and bring new ideas to the table that will help the post. The previous leadership teams have done a fantastic job building and maintaining this post and keeping the member count high. I'd like to help continue this streak by drawing in new members, especially the younger veterans from the Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom campaigns. I think this will be critical if we want our post to continue to be successful, especially during a time where overall VFW membership numbers are down and posts across the country are closing.

How long have you belonged to Post 3063 and did you previously serve in an officer position?

I have been with the post since December 2014. I've held the position of Adjutant since July of 2015.

What is your military background?

I spent over nine years in the Air Force, enlisting as an airman basic in 2005 and separating as a technical sergeant in 2014. My AFSC (MOS for you Army folk) was a 2E2X1, which was a communications/signals career field specializing in computer, network, switching, and cryptographic systems. I spent the majority of my time with the 352d Special Operations Support Squadron out of RAF Mildenhall, England. There I was part of a small tactical communications unit that provided communications support (data/radio) for the 352d Special Operations Group which was comprised of two flying units (MC-130H/P Combat Talons/Shadows) and a special tactics unit (combat controllers).

Aside from the numerous TDYs throughout Europe and Africa, I deployed to Iraq in 2007 to support an Army ODA team in Baghdad (5th SFG). I once again deployed in 2012 to support Army special operators, this time to Afghanistan with 10th SFG where I served as a M-ATV gunner/driver in addition to my commo support duties.

What do you enjoy most about belonging to the VFW?

I like telling people (especially my old AF buddies who are separating from the service) about the VFW and what it can do for them. While I haven't taken advantage of everything that the VFW has to offer, I've really enjoyed the camaraderie in particular. It's the part I missed the most about being in the military. It's great having a seat at the table next to comrades who fought in our previous wars and learning from their experiences and sharing some of mine.

Is there anything else you'd like to tell Post 3063 members?

I haven't mentioned this before to the entire post, but I wanted to take this opportunity to say thanks for being so welcoming. My wife (Clare) and I moved to Seattle from England in 2014 without knowing anyone in the local area, the VFW has been a great source of friendship and support, for that we are both very thankful.

Apps assist veterans, aid in obtaining mental health care

This article first appeared in the August 2016 issue of the VFW magazine.

There's a new way for veterans to access health care. Mobile apps—programs designed for devices such as smartphones and tablets—can help vets cope with ailments such as PTSD, TBI and general anxiety.

Experts say this new frontier will require regulation and careful oversight. But the mental health field may be one area where veterans can use apps in addition to traditional health care to improve their quality of life. Today, both VA and other organizations are working to help create access to care—with the veteran in mind.

According to "Meeting the Behavioral Health Needs of Veterans," a study by the National Council for Behavioral Health, 30%, or nearly 730,000, of the 2.4 million active-duty and reserve military personnel who deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan will have a mental health condition requiring treatment.

Four Apps in Action

The VA Office of Connected Health already has several apps geared toward mental health. Neil Evans, a primary care internist and acting chief of the office, said the apps are a way to add value to existing mental health treatment. This, in turn, increases the value of a patient's health care.

"These apps are all designed to be used along with existing therapy," he said. "If you can augment the com-

munication with their provider, and take those lessons and apply them in their daily life, that's going to improve their experience."

The apps cover a range of mental health concerns—VA's flagship app PTSD Coach was the first. Released in 2011, PTSD Coach is available in 95 countries and has been downloaded more than 300,000 times.

But it's not just for PTSD, said clinical psychologist Julia Hoffman, national director for mobile health at VA's Mental Health Services. PTSD Coach was born out of the idea that patients wanted something to practice outside of therapy. So they talked with experts, clinicians and patients and developed an app to help patients tolerate stress in their everyday lives.

"That is something anyone can identify with, not just people with PTSD," Hoffman said. "Anybody with emotion dysregulation, anger, irritability [and/or] anxiety can benefit from this tool."

Developing PTSD Coach and the other apps for mental health constitute an incredible opportunity to dismiss the stigma that keeps some veterans from getting the care they need, she said.
